Northland's estuaries and harbours shelter 6300 hectares of mangrove which flowers from February to April, yielding both pollen and nectar. Mangroves depend on insects for pollination and honey bees are major contributors along with native flies, bees and butterflies.

Walsh records mangrove honey having "a most unpalatable flavour, reminding one of fermenting

liquor." On the other hand, Kevin Wallace reports the honey to be an "acquired taste" which he and Melissa don't dislike. The granulation is rather coarse and soft.

This column detailed koromiko (*Hebe stricta*) in the April 2016 newsletter. 2017 appears to be a good year for this valuable pollen and nectar source.

News from last Club Day

WBC Inc - Club Meeting 4th March 2017

Three first time attendees at the club day.

Paul Martin chaired the meeting and noted that honey yields have been patchy this year, NZ wide. Comvita, the largest in the industry, is 60% down on volumes.

Northland Pure Honey has no buyer(s) for this year's honey yet.

MPI is putting together a manuka standard (next month), therefore buyers are cautious at the moment. The main players have approx 18 months honey stocks but volumes are down this season, therefore prices are likely to stay steady.

The Club's storage shed is almost completed. We may need one more working bee to finish it – yet to be determined.

ApiNZ Update

- The new manuka standard which has so far taken more than a year to put together will be released later in March. The food safety minister recently met with the ApiNZ board to discuss this.
- There are concerns over bee hive overcrowding. Hive numbers have increased from ¼ million ten years ago to ¾ million now. Codes of conduct do exist and are based on common sense and fair play. So far however they are only binding on ApiNZ members. Regional Councils have an interest in progressing by-laws for apiarists no details available yet.
- Our club committee has agreed we should become a member of ApiNZ (\$230/year). Paul ran a slide presentation outlining why this is a good move. ApiNZ is useful: as a vehicle to talk collectively to government; it funds research eg. biosecurity incursions such as varroa and the giant willow aphid.

Seasonal Bee Keeping Information (David and David)

- Robbing has started (hive against hive). Wasps are here again.
- Good idea to use a bee escape board to clear bees out of the honey super before extraction. Put it on top of the queen excluder for 1-2 days.

- Put varroa strips in once the honey is removed. David P gets good results from 'mite away' (formic acid based with a strong residual vapour).
- Willow honey is around at the moment. It tastes bad and is difficult to extract. Might be best to feed it back to the bees.
- David H grafts queens through to the end of March. David P thought that was too far past the honey flow to allow the new hive to get strong enough before winter, also drone numbers will be down by then.
- Dave H is in the process of developing perforated metal slides as dividers in a box to separate queens. The perforated metal allows for better heat transfer within the box.



AGM in May

As Barbara will be stepping down as Treasurer at the May AGM, someone from the club will be needed to replace her. For details of this position, please see below. Mitch will also be stepping down from the committee and from running the Extraction Plant. Details for this position will appear at a later date.
