Tradition is sometime deeply weird

The caretaker of the royal beehives containing approximately 1 million charges performed an unusual ritual upon Queen Elizabeth's death - he informed each hive of the news. The weird nugget comes via the Daily Mail, which interviewed royal beekeeper John Chapple. "I drape the hives with black ribbon with a bow," he said. "You knock on each hive and say, 'The mistress is dead, but don't you go. Your master will be a good master to you." Chapple did this for the hives - bedecked in black bows - at Clarence House as well as Buckingham Palace. As it turns out, the ritual is rooted in tradition, explains Vanity Fair. Varroa driving colony losses in New Zealand

Bee colonies naturally die over winter due to the pressures of the season, and beekeepers have been surveyed annually since 2015 to record these losses. The percentage of colonies that die over winter has increased every year since then. While problems with queen bees were previously the main issue to which beekeepers attributed losses, 2021 was the first year in which beekeepers identified the parasitic varroa mite as the main cause. The recent news about the discovery of a <u>new bee parasite</u> in New South Wales is a timely reminder that biosecurity needs to be top of mind for our industry, whether hobbyist or commercial beekeeper. It appears the fly was discovered as part of Australia's varroa mite monitoring following an alleged illegal hive movement from Victoria.

We do not have this parasite in New Zealand.

There is a good factsheet on the Braula fly on MPI's website as well as a good image of the fly <u>here</u>. It presents a reminder that any sightings of potential pests should be reported to MPI as soon as possible on its Exotic Pests and Diseases Hotline 0800 80 99 66.

Discussions of potential threats in New Zealand also came up in the recent ApiNZ Biosecurity Focus Group meeting (see article below) with MPI providing an excellent update on its steps to prevent foot and mouth disease entering New Zealand, following Indonesia's recent outbreak. While foot and mouth does not impact bees directly, a question from the group was the potential impact on hive movement in the unlikely event it entered New Zealand. Current thinking is that people (and hive) movement would not be restricted but that good biosecurity practices would need to be implemented.

ApiNZ, with the support of the Biosecurity Focus Group and farming groups has prepared a <u>biosecurity checklist</u> that is a good reminder of what we mean by best practice actions and worth reviewing as we enter the new season.
