
Whareora Hall 10.00am

New honey industry report

A new report on the New Zealand honey industry was published this week by Coriolis Research. The report is an update on a similar study published in 2012. The extensive insights provided give a broad overview of the opportunities that exist for New Zealand to grow our honey exports. As part of the analysis the report also identifies the industry's strategic missteps which have contributed to the current supply and demand imbalance and its implications on prices. Among them, the lack of a unified industry body and a weak regulatory framework are two that the NZ Honey Industry pointed to, and ApiNZ is currently working to address.


<u>Mānuka honey exporter says China trade trip</u> cause for optimism

A mānuka honey exporter says a recent trade trip to China gives cause for optimism that recovery is on the way for the ailing sector.

A decade ago, mānuka honey was characterised by terms like "gold rush", and new beekeepers proliferated, the cost of hives exploded and there were many reports of hive thefts.

But in 2020 the shine left the sector. A big honey supply season coincided with Covid which disrupted export markets.

Inevitable spread of varroa mite prompts

concern for food security and prices

Honey bees pollinate \$4.6 billion worth of food in Australia, but with the inevitable spread of a parasitic mite and the eventual predicted wipe-out of the feral bee population, farmers are warning of an impact at the check-out.

Researchers have previously predicted <u>feral bees</u> <u>will succumb</u> to varroa mite in coming years, which will see demand from pollination-dependent fruit and vegetable producers steeply rise — posing a significant threat to Australia's food productivity.
