Hello Beekeepers,

My name is Gareth Moyle and I am a commercial beekeeper in the Hawkes Bay.

I am emailing you with a brand-new product that is new to New Zealand, and in fact the world! And proudly made in NZ!!

I have designed a repair piece for the broken tags or lugs on your bee frames.

The repair can be done in the field or back at the workshop and takes about 30 seconds. I call this FRENDZ... FRame ENDZ... - designed to repair the damaged end of the bee frame.

FRENDZ are sold in 2 convenient sized carry bags that will not rupture or break open on the floors of your trucks!

Bag sizes include 24 or 48 FRENDZ, all stainless screws as well as a SQ1 drive bit. (All you will need is a small, toothed hand saw, a drill and 2mm drill bit and a bit driver.) I use the Bahco 16-point hand saw and a Bosch driver.

FRENDZ are specifically designed for repairing frames.

No more discarding of valuable waxed out frames – save money- and support sustainable bee keeping practices in NZ - REPAIR AND REUSE

FRENDZ are compatible with both Manley and Hoffman frames - wooden or plastic. Website details are https://www.frendz.co.nz/
