News from last Club Day

Club Day Summary 3rd May 2025

AGM

Opened at 10.12am

Apologies: Morgan Claire and Sue Young.

We had the required quorum and the AGM proceeded. Andrew chaired the meeting. The financials for WBC and NPH were available on the WBC website.

Andrew moved that the minutes from the last AGM be accepted. Mike Fox seconded. Approved.

Sylvie presented the Treasurer's report. She let members know that the Extraction Plant is running at a significant loss and so NPH will look at closing in its current form. The Committee is looking at setting up a modified version of the Plant at our Whareora Hall apiary site.

Andrew moved that the Treasurer's report be accepted. Carlo Lang seconded.

Andrew presented the President report on behalf of Morgan who thanked the WBC committee and the NPH directors and club day helpers for their contributions to the running of the club.

Election of Officers

Suzie stepped down from the committee but will remain as the newsletter coordinator.

News from last Club Day

AGM General Business:

Oue Extraction Plant is no longer viable economically. We are seeing fewer extractions year on year. We relied on several commercial beekeepers to keep the numbers up and they are no longer using our Plant. MPI export licensing is getting more and more expensive.

Andrew and Morgan met with the Whareora Hall committee and agreed that the area around the hives has been set aside for our use. In theory we could move the current extraction room, located at Barfoote's, to this area. We could operate similar to a "food truck" license which excludes needing to pay for the MPI export fees.

Council rules around "food truck" licensing are not as expensive as MPI export fees. We would still be able to sell our honey locally. We would still have to test for tutin.

For this to work we will need some club members to complete a 'food safe' course which WBC will pay for. These 'qualified' members will need to be present when a 'non-qualified' member does an extraction. There will still be a small extraction charge to cover wear and tear.

As a "Club" extraction facility and not a business (as NPH has been) we are then able to apply for grant funding to help with running expenses. That should help our finances a lot.

Questions asked:

- our arrangement with the Whareora Hall will need to be formalized.
- Andrew has investigated what equipment we could get to take the place of the current hot room.
- Water supply will need to be set up.
- A power supply will need to be set up.
- Is selling the Plant an option? Some of the equipment is at the end of its life and has little resale value. We can try to sell what we can.
- The general feeling is this project is worth looking into. It will involve club members being more hands-on with their extractions. As well this is a much cheaper option compared with the current arrangement.

AGM closed at 10.45am

Club Day Meeting

Andrew talked about his troubles with mites and wax moth in one of his hives. He has put strips in and is waiting to see. He has shut it down for better defense. David Herbert suggested closing it to the smallest possible space, therefore a smaller space to heat – maybe transfer to a nuc.

His other hives are doing well. He stressed the importance of timing when using mite treatments.

David Pullen and Bob Sampson use oxalic acid pads with success. Melva said the bees chuck it out and Bob said this is how it works – makes them come into contact with the pads.

New pads need to be added every 3 weeks ideally as that is the length of the brood cycle. You need to keep doing it.

Adrian uses Bt spray to protect waxed frames from moths when storing over winter.

Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt) is generally considered safe for honeybees and other pollinators when used according to label instructions. While Bt is toxic to certain insect larvae, it does not directly harm bees.

Other members have also seen wax moth in their working hives.

Wasps are a problem too. Try to find their entrance hole(s) in the ground and upend a bottle (with petrol in it) to completely block the hole and that gases the wasps.

Pat Vendt won the raffle. Congrats Pat!

<u>Nic Nacs:</u> Mike Fox uses a 'Lazy Susan' arrangement to remove supers. Makes it easier to blow off the bees.



<u>Māori honey producer stung by mānuka</u> <u>rules, fights for future</u>

A Māori honey producer on the East Coast is feeling the pinch of a weak global honey market and stringent honey regulations.

Rangi Raroa has worked in the industry for two decades and has tasted the sweet success of a thriving industry, but he's now in survival mode.

"We haven't been able to sell honey in the last three years and we're right at the stage of winding up, walking away from the hives because you can't give them away."

Five years ago, producers experienced a boom industry. In the decade leading up to 2020, the development of mānuka honey helped accelerate the growth of New Zealand's beekeeping industry.

Bee alert: Warning after 250 million insects escape truck crash in US

A truck crash that set 250 million bees free has sparked warnings in the western US, with police telling people to avoid swarms of the stinging insects.

The accident happened in Washington state in the Far Northwest of the country, when a semi-trailer carrying a load of hives overturned.

"250 million bees are now loose," wrote Whatcom County Sheriff on its social media page.

Beekeepers succeeding against varroa mites

Beekeepers across the country are gaining the upper hand against varroa mite.

Apiculture New Zealand said results from the New Zealand Colony Loss Survey 2024 show that loss rates caused by <u>varroa mites</u> fell to 4.6% during the 2024 winter, from 6.4% during winter 2023.

Varroa mites were the number one threat to bees over winter for the previous three years.

Chief scientist at Manaaki Whenua and survey director for the NZ Colony Loss Survey, Pike Stahlmann-Brown, said this continues a general downward trajectory since the 2021–2022 surveys.
