I've realized that this sector might need a solution aimed at professionalization and embracing the digital. Since I have knowledge and experience on digital products, I've developed a digital solution for beekeepers, simple and easy to use.

So I'm contacting you to introduce the Android mobile application, aimed at professionalization and embracing the digital beekeeper, which was developed in conjunction with local beekeepers (Portugal) with the aim of helping beekeepers track and manage their activities efficiently and intuitively.

You can find the App at Google Play Store, Bee2go.

The application is currently available for free download and free to use till the end of May. For small beekeepers, with up to 10 hives, it will remain free indefinitely. I am looking to gather feedback to see if it meets the needs and to make the necessary improvements.

Bee2Go is an innovative tool that simplifies hive management, allowing beekeepers to focus on what really matters: the health and productivity of their bees. It would be great if 1 or 2 beekeepers of your community try it out and see if it fits your needs.

I believe that collaboration with your association could be extremely beneficial for both parties. By sharing our application among your members, we can help a significant number of beekeepers improve their management practices and, consequently, increase the productivity and sustainability of beekeeping.

As I am open to discussing possible forms of collaboration that may be of interest to your association and its members, should you be interested.

A taste sensation

Last week's three-day Honey Sensory Analysis Workshop saw seven eager participants test their taste buds with over 100 different honey varietals from around New Zealand and the Pacific.

Course coordinator Maureen Conquer says basic tasting techniques and how to recall and record tastes were the foundation of the course. She says good records are vital for training a honey taster's memory and helping them make decisions in the pack house or field.

Attendees were particularly interested in the horizontal tastings – the same variety grown in different areas and vertical tastings – the same honey from the same site over different years evaluating how honey taste changes as it matures.

The field trip to Comvita's wellness lab in Auckland was another highlight of the course, says Maureen. The variety of backgrounds around the table - laboratory technicians, beekeepers and packers – made for interesting discussion, Maureen says. Although some attendees had done the Italian honey sommelier course, none had done a course specifically designed for New Zealand honeys. The positive feedback and enthusiasm of the participants has encouraged Maureen to repeat the

NZ BeeKeeper journal now free and online



NZ Honey Market Update March 2024

The ApiNZ Science & Research Focus Group had a productive meeting on Monday including an update from the Environmental Protection Authority (EPA). The Science & Research Focus Group plays an important role in ensuring that bee health is a consideration in the work EPA does, from submissions on new pesticide treatments, to labelling of product, to making sure the public know how to protect bees if they need to use chemicals.

One of the issues the group has regularly raised is the lack of data on pesticides and chemicals from a use and volume perspective. We were pleased to hear that the EPA is looking to update its importers and manufacturers notice, proposing to make it mandatory to report on the volumes of active ingredients in pesticides including agriculture pesticides. While this has taken too long, given it was a recommendation made by the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment several years ago, there is a clear recognition that "you can't manage, what you don't measure." Those were welcome words to the scientists in the room who have been pushing for better data for many years.
